NOTICE OF HEARING & DISCONTINUANCE IN CANADIAN AUTO PARTS PRICE-FIXING CLASS ACTIONS

If you bought or leased, directly or indirectly, a new or used Automotive Vehicle or certain automotive parts, since March 1996, you should read this notice carefully.

It may affect your legal rights.

A. WHAT IS THIS NOTICE ABOUT?

This notice relates to proposed settlements in the class actions listed in Part C below, and the discontinuance of claims relating to industry bearings (see Part K).

B. WHAT IS A CLASS ACTION?

A class action is a lawsuit filed by one person on behalf of a large group of people.

C. WHAT ARE THESE CLASS ACTIONS ABOUT?

Class actions have been started in Canada claiming that many companies participated in conspiracies to fix the prices of automotive parts sold in Canada and/or sold to manufacturers for installation in Automotive Vehicles¹ sold in Canada.

This notice is about class actions relating to the following automotive parts (the "Relevant Parts"):

A rear combination light is an automotive light installed in the rear of an Automotive Vehicle, and may include a back-up light, tail light, stop light, and/or turn signal.	June 1, 1997 to April 2, 2019

In the Alpha, Continental, Espar, JTEKT, Koito, Maruyasu, Meritor, NTN, Tokai Rika, Toyo Tire, and Yamashita Settlements, Automotive Vehicle is defined as: all passenger cars, sport utility vehicles (SUVs), vans, and light trucks (up to 10,000 lbs). In the Tenneco and Toyoda Gosei Settlement, Automotive Vehicle is defined as: all automobiles, passenger cars, sport utility vehicles (SUVs), vans, trucks, buses, and without limitation, any other type of vehicle containing Alleged Parts.

Automotive Hoses	Automotive Hoses means high and low pressure hoses made from a variety of materials, including but not limited to rubber, metal, and silicone, which carry and transfer fluid throughout and between various component parts of an Automotive Vehicle.	February 1, 2004 to April 2, 2019
Automotive Steel Tubes	Automotive Steel Tubes means tubes used in Automotive Vehicles for fuel distribution, braking and other automotive systems, including, without limitation, chassis tubes (including brake and fuel tubes) and engine parts (including fuel injection rails, oil level tubes, and oil strainer tubes). For the purposes of this Settlement Agreement, the term Fuel Injection Systems includes any of the components of such systems including, without limitation: injectors; high pressure pumps; rail assemblies; feed lines; fuel pumps; fuel pump modules; electronic throttle bodies, airflow meters, engine electronic control units, manifold absolute pressure sensors, pressure regulators, pulsation dampers; purge control valves; and other components sold as a unitary system.	January 1, 2000 to March 20, 2017
Heater Control Panels	Heater Control Panels are the operational panels located in the centre console of an Automotive Vehicle, which incorporate buttons and switches to control the temperature of the interior environment of an Automotive Vehicle.	January 1, 2000 to November 2, 2016
High Intensity Discharge Ballasts	High Intensity Discharge Ballasts are electrical devices that limit the amount of electrical current flowing to a high intensity discharge headlamp installed in an Automotive Vehicle, which would otherwise rise to destructive levels due to the high intensity discharge headlamp's negative resistance.	July 1, 1998 to August 13, 2018.
Instrument Panel Clusters	Instrument Panel Clusters means the mounted array of instruments and gauges, also known as meters, housed in front of the driver of an Automotive Vehicle.	January 1, 1998 to December 9, 2015
Occupant Safety Systems	Occupant Safety Systems are the collection of safety devices in Automotive Vehicles, including but not limited to seat belts, steering wheels, and air bags.	January 1, 2003 to December 4, 2014

The class actions were started in British Columbia, Ontario and/or Quebec, but include Canadian residents in all provinces and territories. The class actions claim that the companies that sell the Relevant Parts were involved in conspiracies to illegally increase the prices of these products. These class actions ask the applicable Courts to require these companies to return any extra money they may have received due to the alleged conspiracies.

D. WHO IS AFFECTED BY THE CLASS ACTIONS?

These class actions were certified as class proceedings as against the Settling Defendants for the purposes of implementing the settlement agreements.

You are affected by the class actions mentioned above and/or are a "member" of the settlement class of those actions if you are a person in Canada who, during the relevant class period (as set out in the chart above):

- purchased or leased, directly or indirectly, a new or used Automotive Vehicle in Canada;
- purchased a new or used Automotive Vehicle for import into Canada; or
- purchased, directly or indirectly, a Relevant Part in Canada.

E. WHAT SETTLEMENTS HAVE BEEN REACHED IN THE CLASS ACTIONS?

A settlement is when a defendant agrees to pay money to the members of the class action in exchange for full release of the claims against them, without admitting liability for any of the claims. The Settling Defendants do not admit any liability, wrongdoing or fault.

- Koito Manufacturing Co., Ltd. and North American Lighting, Inc. ("Koito");
- Maruyasu Industries Co., Ltd. and Curtis-Maruyasu America, Inc. ("Maruyasu");

These defendants ("Settling Defendants") have agreed to pay the amounts set out below in exchange for a full release of the claims against them relating to the pricing of the Relevant Parts (in the case of Tokai Rika, the pricing of Wire Harnesses³) and for the dismissal of any actions commenced in Canada by settlement class members relating to the pricing of the Relevant Parts.⁴

Wire Harnesses are assemblies of cables and other integrated components that transmit signals or electric power between electronic components throughout an Automotive Vehicle. The Tokai Rika settlement provides for a release of claims relating to the pricing of Automotive Wire Harness Systems because Tokai Rika had previously been named in the Automotive Wire Harness Systems action (that action was discontinued as against Tokai Rika).

The exact terms of the releases and dismissals vary slightly as between the Settlement Agreements. Please refer to the Settlement Agreements for additional information.

The Settling Defendants have also agreed to provide cooperation to the plaintiffs in pursuing the applicable class actions against the remaining defendants. The Settling Defendants do not admit any liability, wrongdoing or fault.

F. SETTLEMENT APPROVAL HEARINGS

Depending on where each action was commenced, the settlements are subject to the approval of one or more of the Ontario, British Columbia and/or Quebec Courts. However, in all circumstances, the settlements are national in scope. Even where there is no action commenced in British Columbia or Quebec, residents of those provinces are included in the national classes of the actions commenced in Ontario.

The Ontario Court will hold a hearing to decide whether to approve these settlements at Osgoode Hall, 130 Queen Street West, in the City of Toronto on August 27, 2020 at 10:00 a.m. Depending on the status of the COVID-19 situation, it is possible that the Ontario hearing will proceed by videoconference, teleconference or in writing. Please visit www.siskinds.com/autoparts for updates.

The Quebec Court will hold a hearing to decide whether to approve some of these settlements in virtual hearing room 9001 (https://webrtc.scvc.gouv.qc.ca; code: 86219001)⁵ on September 24, 2020 at 9:00 a.m.

In accordance with the *Canadian Judicial Protocol for the Management of Multi-Jurisdictional Class Actions*, if the Ontario Court approves the settlements, the BC settlement approval applications will be heard in writing.

The Courts will decide whether the settlements are fair, reasonable, and in the best interests of settlement class members.

G. WHAT STEPS SHOULD I TAKE TO PROTECT MY RIGHTS?

If you want to be a member of any of these class actions, you do not need to do anything. However, there are three steps that you should take to protect your legal rights:

- 1. You should keep records of any purchases or leases of all new Automotive Vehicles, Relevant Parts or other automotive parts in respect of which there is pending litigation (see www.siskinds.com/autoparts for a complete list) from January 1995 onward. Records include invoices, receipts and bank or loan statements.
- 2. Automotive dealerships should keep records of any sales or leases of new Automotive Vehicles, Relevant Parts or other automotive parts from January 1995 onward.
- 3. You should register online at www.siskinds.com/autoparts to receive updates about these class actions and the other auto parts price-fixing class actions.

There are over 40 cases pending in Canada relating to the alleged price-fixing of automotive parts relating to conduct as far back as January 1995. See www.siskinds.com/autoparts for a complete list of cases. You should keep related purchase records from January 1995 onward.

H. HOW CAN I PARTICIPATE IN THE SETTLEMENT APPROVAL HEARING?

If you are a member of a settlement class, you can present your submissions on, or objections to, the settlements before the Courts, in the manner set out below.

Submissions in writing

If you want to address the Courts in writing, you must send your written submissions to Class Counsel by email to autoparts@sotosllp.com and autopartsclassaction@siskinds.com no later than August 24, 2020.

The written submissions must state the nature of any comments or objections, and whether you intend to appear at the settlement approval hearing(s). The written submissions can be provided in English or French (where necessary, an unofficial translation will be provided to the Courts).

Class Counsel will provide a copy of any written submissions to the Courts being asked to approve the settlement agreements.

Attending in person before the Courts

All members of the settlement classes may (but do not need to) attend the hearing before the applicable Courts to approve the settlements.

Some of the settlements are only subject to approval by the Ontario Court. You may attend the Ontario hearing in person by being present at Osgoode Hall, 130 Queen Street West, in the City of Toronto on August 27, 2020 at 10:00 a.m. Depending on the status of the COVID-19 situation, it is possible that the Ontario hearing will proceed by videoconference, teleconference or in writing. Please visit www.siskinds.com/autoparts for updates.

You can attend the Ontario hearing as an observer or to make oral submissions to the Court. If you wish to make oral submissions, please contact Class Counsel no later than August 24, 2020. If you are unable to attend in person, but wish to make oral submissions to the Ontario Court, please contact Class Counsel at autopartsclassaction@siskinds.com and Class Counsel will make the necessary arrangements for you to make submissions to the Ontario Court.

Where the settlement is also subject to the approval of the Quebec Court, you may attend the Quebec hearing via videoconference (https://webrtc.scvc.gouv.qc.ca; code: 86219001)⁶. You can attend as an observer or to make oral submissions to the Quebec Court. If you are unable to attend, but wish to make oral submissions to the Quebec Court, please contact Class Counsel at recours@siskindsdesmeules.com, to the attention of Karim Diallo, and Class Counsel will make the necessary arrangements for you to make submissions to the Quebec Court.

I. WHAT HAPPENS TO THE MONEY PAID UNDER THE SETTLEMENTS?

At this stage, the settlement funds (less approved fees and expenses) are being held in interest-bearing trust accounts for the benefit of settlement class members. At a later date, the courts will decide how the settlement funds will be distributed and how you can apply to receive money from these settlements. Watch for another notice at a later time explaining how to claim money from the settlements.

J. WHAT IF I DON'T WANT TO BE IN THE CLASS ACTIONS?

Members of the Anti-Vibration Rubber Parts, Autolights, Automotive Brake Hoses, Automotive Exhaust Systems, Automotive Hoses, Body Sealing Parts, EPS Assemblies, Fuel Injection Systems, Heater Control Panels, HID Ballasts, Instrument Panel Clusters, Occupant Safety Systems, and Switches actions were previously provided an opportunity to exclude themselves from the class actions ("opt out") and were advised that no further right to opt out would be provided.

Members of the Automotive Access Mechanisms, Automotive Constant-Velocity-Joint Boot Products, Automotive Steel Tubes, Bearings, Plastic Interior Trim, and Steering Angle Sensors settlement classes can opt out.

You can opt out by sending a signed letter to Class Counsel, with the following information:

- your full name, current address and telephone number;
- if you are writing on behalf of a company, the name of the company and your position at the company; and
- a statement saying that you (or the company) want to opt out of the class actions. You must identify which class actions you (or the company) want to opt out of.

Requests to opt out of the proceedings must be post-marked by October 5, 2020.

If you are a resident of Québec and wish to opt out, you must also send your opt-out letter to the Clerk of the Superior Court of Quebec, located at 300, Boulevard Jean-Lesage, Québec (Québec) G1K 8K6, by October 5, 2020.

If you exclude yourself or opt out:

- you will not be eligible to participate in the ongoing class action, and
- you will <u>not</u> receive any money from the class action, <u>but</u>
- you will be able to start or continue your own case against the defendants regarding the claims at issue in the class action.

If you do nothing, and so do <u>not</u> exclude yourself or opt out:

- you will be eligible to participate in the ongoing class action, and
- you may receive money from the class action, but
- you will <u>not</u> be able to start or continue your own case against the defendants regarding the claims at issue in the class action.

This is your only chance to exclude yourself or opt out of the class actions relating to Automotive Access Mechanisms, Automotive Constant-Velocity-Joint Boot Products, Automotive Steel Tubes, Bearings, Plastic Interior Trim, and Steering Angle Sensors. No further right to opt out will be provided.

Parallel class proceedings were commenced in Ontario and British Columbia against other defendants relating to the pricing of Plastic Interior Trim. The right to opt out applies in those actions as well and no further right to opt out will be provided in respect of those actions. Information on those actions and the companies named as defendants is available on Class Counsel's website at: www.siskinds.com/autoparts.

K. NOTICE OF DISCONTINUANCE IN BEARINGS CLASS ACTION

The Bearings Statement of Claim currently asserts claims on behalf of persons in Canada who purchased bearings and/or who purchased and/or leased products containing bearings (including automotive vehicles, light, medium and heavy duty vehicles, buses, commercial vehicles, industrial machinery, construction equipment, mining equipment and/or railway vehicles).

The Ontario Court approved amendments to the Bearings Statement of Claim to discontinue the industrial bearings portion of the class action. As a result, the class action will only advance claims relating to bearings installed in new Automotive Vehicles. These claims are advanced on behalf of persons in

Canada who purchased bearings for installation in new Automotive Vehicles and/or who purchased or leased new Automotive Vehicles.

If you purchased industrial bearings and/or purchased and/or leased industrial machinery containing bearings you may have the option of commencing your own action. The limitation period for bringing a claim, if there is any time left within it, will recommence on October 5, 2020, subject to any tolling of limitation periods as a result of COVID-19. On the expiry of the limitation period, your right to sue may be extinguished. Limitation periods vary across Canada. As a result, you should seek legal advice from local counsel.

If you wish to pursue a court claim regarding industrial bearings or industrial machinery containing bearings, you should issue a Notice of Action or Statement of Claim (or equivalent document in your province), if you have not already done so, before the applicable limitation period expires. You may wish to consult your own lawyer about this.

L. WHO ARE THE LAWYERS WORKING ON THESE CLASS ACTIONS AND HOW ARE THEY PAID?
